ASL 2, Part 1

Course Description:

This course continues the grammar and skills introduced in ASL 1. It teaches intermediate conversation, grammar, and vocabulary. The focus is on expressive and receptive American Sign Language, fingerspelling, and the culture of the Deaf community. Each unit will cover vocabulary related to a specific theme (Travel, Nature and Environment, Storytelling, etc.) and grammar concepts appropriate to level 2.

You'll also practice fingerspelling and learn more tips for improving your fingerspelling reception. After that warm-up, you'll learn more advanced vocabulary to talk about everyday subjects. You'll learn about comparatives and superlatives, and contrastive structure. You will review and expand your ability to use inflection to show continued and repeated events. You will also learn vocabulary for agreeing and disagreeing, and the structure for forming conditional sentences.
